What's a Temperature Inversion?

Have you ever noticed that when you walk or bike down a dip in the road that it is cooler in the bottom of the dip than on top? That's kind of like a temperature inversion: when cooler air is trapped below warmer air. It's most common in winter, as the night cools the air, and it takes a while for the sun to heat up the cool air and ground the next day.

The problem is that the cooler air is trapped when people are getting ready for their day, driving to school and work. The pollution, or dirty air, from vehicles gets trapped in the cooler air, and that's the air we breathe. Later, when the sun heats up the ground and lower air, the pollution won't be trapped and will rise and spread out.

We need more than spells and magic to help clean the air. The "Wizard of Air" is here with answers to your every day air questions.

Q: My mom drives me to school. If I walked to school, it wouldn't make much difference, would it? It's just one extra car.

A: If you live close enough to school, you can walk or bike safely, and your parents say it's okay, we recommend that you skip the ride from your mom. You'd be helping the air in more ways than one. First, you'd reduce the amount of miles the car drives and pollutes. Secondly, you'd be reducing the amount of cars idling at the school. Idling is when you're parked, but the engine is still on. Idling makes a lot of dirty air (air pollution). If you still need a lift, have your mom turn the car off as you say good-bye, and when she waits for you at the end of the day. Or, park a block away and walk the rest of the way to school. Another way to drive and reduce air pollution is to share rides with school mates who live in your neighborhood. That's called carpooling.

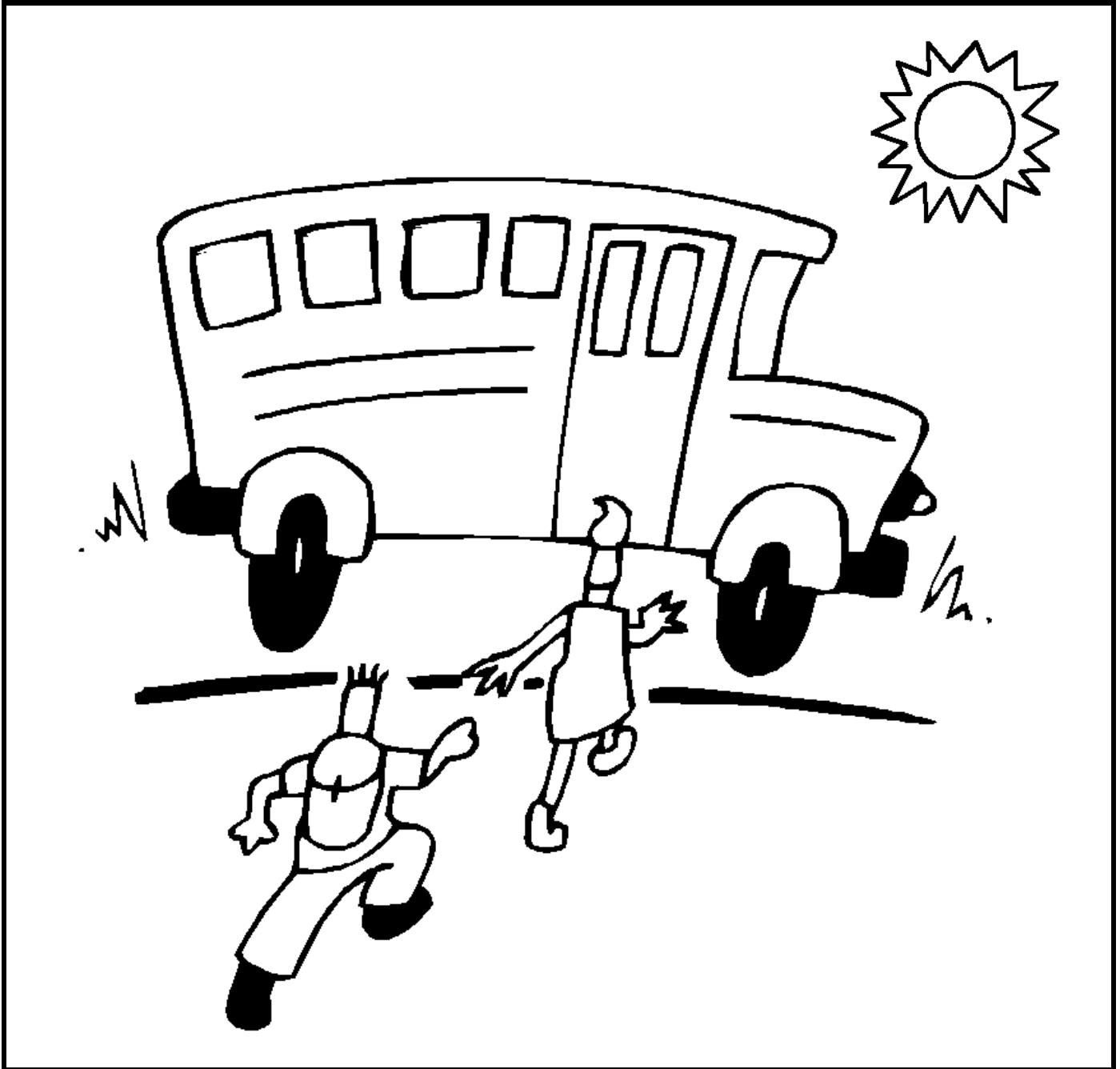

Earth Day Festival and Parade April 16, 2005

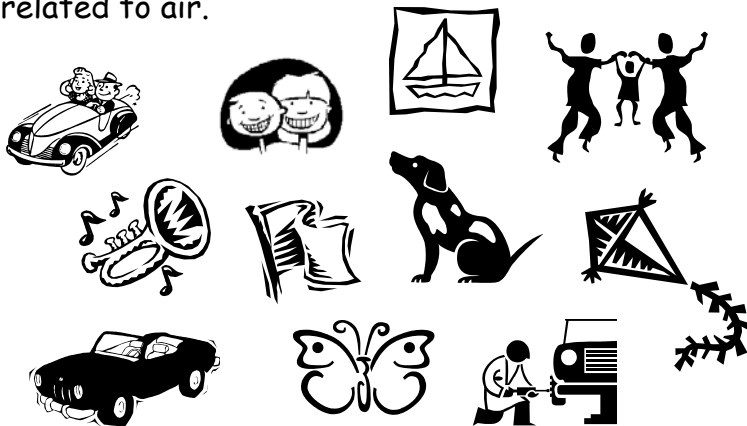
